

## MINUTES - REGULAR MEETING

October 9, 2019

The Regular Meeting of the Borough of Sea Girt Council was called to order by Mayor F. Ken Farrell at 7:00 PM on Wednesday, October 9, 2019 at the Sea Girt Elementary School, Bell Place, Sea Girt. Mayor Farrell asked for a moment of silence; he then led those in attendance in the Pledge of Allegiance.

The Deputy Municipal Clerk read the Compliance Statement: This meeting is called pursuant to the provisions of the Open Public Meetings Act, C.231, P.L.1975: adequate notice of this Regular Meeting has been given by posting a notice on the Borough's official bulletin board and by transmitting a copy of the Notice to the Borough's two official newspapers, *The Asbury Park Press* and *The Coast Star* as required by law.

### 2. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION ON ANY CONSENT AGENDA ITEM: There were no comments from the public at this time.

3. **CONSENT AGENDA - Resolution No. 179-2019: UPON MOTION** of Council President Fetzer, seconded by Councilman Mulroy, carried, that the following Resolutions be and the same is hereby adopted:

#### A. Urge The Legislature and Governor Murphy to Permanently Extend the 2% Cap on Binding Interest Arbitration Awards.

Mayor Farrell commented he is in favor of the resolution as the increase in the Consumer Price Index over the last 10 years averaged 1.6%.

**WHEREAS**, the failure to permanently extend the 2.0% cap on binding interest arbitration awards has inequitably altered the collective bargaining process in favor of labor at the expense of property taxpayers as police and fire unions have been aggressively leveraging its expiration to win contracts that far exceed the 2.0% spending cap imposed on local governing bodies for nearly a decade; and,

**WHEREAS**, between 2011 and 2017, the 2.0% cap on binding interest arbitration awards allowed local governments to live within their limited means and kept public safety employee salaries and wages under control as parties were closer to an agreement from the onset of negotiations; and,

**WHEREAS**, the 2.0% cap on binding interest arbitration awards established clear parameters for negotiating reasonable successor contracts that preserved the collective bargaining process and took into consideration the separate and permanent 2.0% spending cap; and,

**WHEREAS**, recent arbitration decisions, which do not readily disclose the total cost of the contract, underscore the vital need to restore the cap as at least one of the awards included annual salary increases that range from a minimum of 8.54% to a maximum of 20.54% when step increases are included with the widely reported annual raises of 2.0% to 2.25%; and,

**WHEREAS**, these substantial annual salary increases do not include longevity pay, employer pension contributions of which equal approximately 30.0% of the annual salary of a public safety sector employer, and an additional 20.0% to 35% in employer health benefit contributions; and,

**WHEREAS**, the equation is clear, failure to permanently extend the 2.0% cap on binding interest arbitration awards is unsustainable without increasing property taxes, reducing non-union staff, or eliminating essential services.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the “Board of Chosen Freeholders of ...” does in fact, hereby urge Governor Phil Murphy and the New Jersey State Legislature to enact legislation that will permanently extend the 2.0% cap on binding interest arbitration awards that expired in 2017; and, to further require the Public Employment Relations Commission (PERC) to include in all arbitration awards: a full financial impact statement that summarizes the total cost of all awards in a clear, concise, and transparent manner.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that certified copies of this Resolution are forwarded to the Governor of the State of New Jersey Phil Murphy, the President of the New Jersey State Senate Stephen M. Sweeney, and the Speaker of the General Assembly Craig J. Coughlin.

**B. Application for Raffle License, PTO Elementary School, November 24, 2019 at 4:00 pm.**

**WHEREAS**, the Sea Girt Elementary School Parent-Teacher Organization has made application to the Borough Council for a license to conduct a raffle for the benefit of the Sea Girt Elementary School, on November 18, 2018 at 4:00 PM.

**WHEREAS**, the above is being conducted in accordance with Findings and Determinations of the verifying officer.

### A. Resolution No. 182-2019: Authorizing the Purchase of Equipment for the Sea Girt Water Utility Pursuant to the SMMUA Cooperative Purchasing Program

**WHEREAS**, the Borough of Sea Girt Water Utility has identified the need to order equipment necessary to the operation of said Utility; and,

**WHEREAS**, the Borough is a member of the SMMUA Cooperative Purchasing Program who has entered into a contract with Core & Main, LP to provide various equipment for SMMUA participants; and,

**WHEREAS**, the equipment to be purchased includes meters, MXU's, and other accessories necessary to the operation of said meters and MXU's; and,

**WHEREAS**, the Chief Financial Officer has certified that funds are available for this purchase in the following listed Water Capital Accounts: W-06-55-579-501; W-06-55-585-501 and W-06-55-591-501.

**8. ADMINISTRATOR REPORTS/DISCUSSION**

**A. Public Works Updates:**

- **Leaf Pick-Up** begins on October 15 through December 15, 2019, inclusive; please do not mix grass, flowers, branches or other debris with the leaves; do not place piles of leaves within 15 feet of a storm drain or the intersection of Rt. 71; no leaves permitted on Rt. 71.
- Monday, October 21<sup>st</sup> is the last scheduled bulk pick-up day of the year.

**B. Halloween Haunted Hayride/Celebration** – Friday, October 18 – children up to age 6, 6:30 – 7:30 PM; children ages 7 and up, 7:30 – 8:30 PM; celebration immediately follows in the Fire House (bring a treat for the sharing table); parents must accompany children.

**C. Clean Ocean Action Fall Beach Sweeps** will be held on October 26 beginning at 9:00 AM; meet at the Pavilion on Beacon Blvd. Please wear hats and hard-soled shoes; bring gloves and use sunscreen.

**D. Chapter IV, Licensing and Business Regulation, Section 4-10.9, Fees:** regarding licensure of taxicabs – is there a consensus to reduce or eliminate taxicab owner and drivers' fees; current fee schedule is \$150 for an owner's license for up to 5 vehicles with \$50 each additional vehicle; \$25 for a driver's license that is waived if the driver is also an owner. Recommended: owner's license: \$50 for up to five vehicles, \$10 each additional vehicle up to five additional vehicles to a 10 vehicle maximum; no change to driver only license fee.

10. **Other:** Chief's Report on the 2019 operation of the Ocean Avenue Loading Zone pursuant to Borough Code (*copy attached for Minutes*)

11. **COUNCIL REPORTS:** Councilpersons Clemmensen, Anthony and Mulroy had no report.

Councilman Mastroilli reported as follows:

- Recreation Committee: summer recreation was successful; 129 children; program was under budget; would like to see more events for the older kids; feedback on the upgrades at Baltimore Park are positive; schedule spraying for pesticides when recreation ends; areas of uneven ground need repair by DPW; post sign at Baltimore Park saying park is reserved during recreation hours; address minor repairs on the tennis and paddle courts before they become major repairs; recreation trust account \$114K; Mike D'Altrui, Recreation Chair donated \$37,000.00 from the proceeds of the 2019 Sea Girt 5K;
- Edgemere Park – Councilwoman Anthony presented her vision;
- Halloween Hayride – Kurt Sackariassen is seeking volunteers for the hayride;
- Thanked Recreation members and staff for their efforts throughout the year.

Council President Fetzer reported as follows:

- DPW contract negotiations ongoing;
- Eighth Avenue water main looping is complete except for restoration;
- Water Infrastructure Program complete; pre-budget discussions for next year.

Mayor Farrell reported as follows:

- Mrs. Carafa met with JCP&L on the ongoing lighting project on Washington Blvd;
- Curbing is being done by Fernandes Construction on Eighth and Washington Blvd.; requesting a quote from them to put a top coat on Crescent Pkwy between Rt. 71 and Eighth Ave.
- County is paying for paving on Eighth Ave. and Washington Blvd.
- Final bulk pickup is on October 21<sup>st</sup>.

**13. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION ON ANY SUBJECT** (*Comments limited to 7 minutes*)

Jeff Oaks, Oceanport, opposes the ban of cannabis dispensary stating that it creates a shortage of medication to patients in New Jersey medical marijuana program; consider a resolution that would support medical cannabis.

Jeffrey King, 24 Elizabeth Pkwy, Eatontown, stated his is also an advocate of medical cannabis and dispensary.

Edward Lefty Grimes, East Hanover, commented his dismay on a medical ban; uses cannabis to avoid off opioids; he asked council to rescind the ban on medical marijuana to help the sick and dying.

Alan Zakin, Baltimore Blvd., asked if there was a plan to suspend any spending which was contracted with the Architect; he noted he would like to see scope of work and budget summaries on the website. Mayor Farrell noted that plans are still being reviewed, if the Borough Hall is sold, the money would have to be returned to the heirs of the people who donated the land and the building; building is not up to code; waiting on results of the referendum in November 2020. Mr. Zakin would like to see Professional Service Awards on the website or available at the Borough Hall.

Councilman Mastroilli noted he would also like to see more information available on the website for better transparency; land sale breakdown would be helpful for the residents.

Mr. Kregg, Boston Blvd., noted he lived in Sea Girt all his life; this is the most active council he has seen in ten years; surplus is \$1.25MM and doesn't understand why the public is now questioning how the council is spending money; supports upgrades to the library and town hall.

There being no further comments from the public and by consensus, the public hearing was closed at 8:05 PM. Mayor Farrell advised that Council has existing and potential litigation matters to discuss in Executive Session, and requested a motion to adjourn for purposes of the discussion; he further noted that action may be taken by Council upon return to public session and that the public is invited to remain outside and may return to the meeting room when the Council returns to public session. **UPON MOTION** of Council President Fetzer, seconded by Councilman Mulroy, carried, the following **Resolution No. 185-2019** be and the same is hereby adopted:

**WHEREAS**, Section 8 of the Open Public Meeting Act, N.J.S.A. 10:4-12 permits the exclusion of the public from a meeting in certain circumstances; and,

**WHEREAS**, this public body is of the opinion that such circumstances presently exist.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, by the Borough Council of the Borough of Sea Girt, County of Monmouth, State of New Jersey, as follows:

1. The public shall be excluded from discussion of and action upon the hereinafter specified subject matter.

  - b. Kenneth Hagel v. Kevin Davenport, Individually and in his official capacity as Chief of the Borough of Sea Girt Police Department; the Borough of Sea Girt Police Department and the Borough of Sea Girt;
  - c. Tess and Brian Manley, Denis Lauzon and Candace Kadimik v. the Borough of Sea Girt, Sandy Ratz and Christopher Willms
  - d. Potential litigation

## 2019 Ride Share Report

### Sea Girt Council

Good evening,

I stand before you to provide data and insight to the loading and unloading zone on Ocean Ave just south of Beacon Blvd. I can say it has been very difficult to come up with a solution that everyone will be pleased with. I want to say, I will continue to explore every option we may have to please everyone. I also would like to say, I have to base my decision solely on public safety. I have estimated 200-300 cars utilizing the loading zone every Friday, Saturday and Sunday from 3pm-1200am. This is what I believe to be a conservative number. In 2017, the media reported the Parker House to be a top 10 destination for ride share pick up and drop offs in the State of New Jersey. This places a tremendous burden on the surrounding neighbors and our officers tasked to maintain a safe environment for all who get dropped off and picked up every weekend at the PH. I am sure many can agree, there is no easy solution to this task.

This summer I am reporting a dramatic drop off in all Borough Ordinance Violations with the exception of alcohol in public which increased from 2018 29%. I feel this can be attributed to our officers concentrating their attention in the designated loading and unloading zone. This also cut down on the amount of littering and urinating in public. Previous years without the loading zone, ride share vehicles would stop throughout the 4 block area of the PH which was a challenge

for our officers. This also presented a problem since officers had to be tasked with enforcing motor vehicle violations which ultimately kept them from addressing quality of life issues throughout the area.

I understand there has been very few people in favor of the loading zone on Ocean Ave, however after feedback from traffic consultants, traffic engineers and members of Council, I felt the current location on Ocean Ave provides the safest alternative for beach patrons, pavilion deliveries and ride share customers for the Parker House. In my opinion which is based on my observations and the feedback from my supervisors, I feel the loading zone worked very efficiently and effectively. Traffic flowed smoothly throughout the area with no backups on Beacon Blvd. I also observed it being used in the daytime hours especially with the unloading of deliveries for the pavilion and beach patrons.

I would like to take this time to discuss some other options that have been suggested such as moving it onto First Ave. I am strongly against this option and any option that involved putting cars on First Ave. Establishing a loading/unloading zone with hundreds of people on a busier county road would be flat out dangerous. We have worked very hard to remove pedestrian traffic and our officer stationed on First ave by putting waiting patrons on the rear lot of the PH. Our officers are tasked with the continuous problem of keeping people out of the street on Beacon Blvd. If we established a

loading/unloading zone on First Ave someone will eventually walk between two cars and get struck by a vehicle. It is not a matter of if, but, when. Utilizing First Ave would also require me to put officers in the street on First Ave, which would increase the risk of them getting hit by a car as well. Taxis and rideshare vehicles have never been allowed to pick up or drop off on First Ave in the 30 years I have been employed by the Borough.

I have proposed 3 options with respect to a loading/unloading zone. This is my proposal based on #1 being preferred to #3 as being least preferred.

#1 - Extend to the east of the taxi zone four parking spaces, which would be directly be in front of #2 Beacon Blvd. This in my opinion would be the safest alternative since pedestrians exiting and entering ride share vehicles would not have to negotiate any cross streets or intersections and be closest to the Parker House. Parking in this proposed area would be restricted from 3pm-12:00 am Friday, Saturday and Sundays for the four mentioned parking spaces. In an effort to preserve parking spaces for residents in the 000 block of Beacon, perhaps we could establish parking for residents only VIA a sticker program for the hours of 3:00pm-1200am. This would make up for the 4 parking spaces lost for the extended loading/unloading zone.

#2 - Keep the same loading/unloading zone on Ocean Ave in the same location and adding a cutout in the boardwalk in the

center of the loading/unloading zone to allow people to access the boardwalk immediately upon entering or exiting vehicles. This cutout may cut down on the reported noise by neighbors as we may be able to stage people up on the boardwalk opposed to the street as they await for their rides. This would enhance safety as well by keeping people out of the street.

#3 - Do not designate any loading or unloading zone. This is NOT A VIABLE SUGGESTION, as in my opinion we would be taking a step backwards in overall safety and quality of life complaints. Currently, we monitor the loading and unloading zone for ordinance violations which would not be visible and very difficult if not impossible to effectively enforce as vehicles would be dropping off in numerous locations in the area of the PH. As we experienced in 2016 and 2017 before the implementation of the zone, we experienced traffic backups, and increased complaints of traffic, littering, open alcohol and urinating in public violations. I will continue to work with residents and management of the Parker House to search for a solution that everyone can agree on that meets both public safety and quality of life concerns.
